Gritty Gort end long title wait

All-Ireland Club hurling champions are floored as late pointed frees from Coen and Harte carry the day

TWO injury-time frees from captain Andy Coen and man of the match Aidan Harte ended a 28-year barren spell for Gort's senior hurlers, who despite having conceded the lead late on, found that extra gear to eventually see off defending champions Clarinbridge in a thoroughly enjoyable county senior hurling final at Pearse Stadium on Sunday.

In the end, it was a victory well-deserved. While an impressive Gort outfit had hurled with great intensity and passion throughout, it was their disciplined execution of their game-plan that, at last, secured the club this sixth senior county title in front of a crowd of almost 9,000.

Over the past year, All-Ireland champions Clarinbridge – and what great ambassadors they have been – have built their game-plan around an impenetrable half-back line partnership of Jamie Cannon, David Forde and Michael Donoghue, the insatiable work ethic of Barry Daly, and the speed and precision of the 'Bridge attack.

On Sunday, though, the Mattie Murphy led management team and players had their homework done. Targeting the champions' key areas, they brought the necessary intensity – and, more importantly, the discipline – to stifle and smother their opponents.

The Gort defence was simply outstanding and, unlike many contests, it's difficult to laud one defender over another. Granted, Michael Cummins does deserve particular credit for the job he did in tying up the 'Bridge's Eoin Forde, but in saying that the contributions of Coen, Mark McMahon, Greg Lally, Brian Regan and the pacy Jason Grealish were equally as pivotal to the out-

come of this game.

In centre-field, Sylvie Óg
Linnane and Sean Forde, especially in the first half, worked
tirelessly to close down the
space in the middle third, while
up front the industry of the
Gort attack – particularly in
closing down the Clarinbridge
half-back unit – was no more
typified than by the toil and
graft of Paul Killilea on the
wing and full-forward Ollie
Fahy inside.

Their combined evertions

Their combined exertions totally disrupted and negated the quality of ball delivered by the Clarinbridge backs into their danger-men while also allowing Harte – who pulled David Forde all over the field – and corner forward Gerard O'Donoghue to pick off some neat points from play. And this, ultimately was the leave

ultimately, was the key. Gort, in recent years anyway, have proven to be a real goal machine and, by and large, the majority of their championship victories have been achieved thanks to their ability to find the net. You have to go back to the knockout stages of the 2008 campaign to find their last championship win - that over Carnmore without the South Galway outfit tallying a goal. Indeed, in their last 30 championship games in the last five years, they have scored goals in 26 of

Consequently, Clarinbridge could be forgiven for believing that if they did not concede a major, then they would achieve back-to-back title wins, so it's a credit to all concerned in Gort that they, to some extent, were able to reinvent themselves for the 2011 decider.

Not that Gort didn't create those opportunities. Having started in whirlwind fashion, with midfielder Sean Forde registering the opening score after 30 seconds, wing forward Gerry Quinn had an effort blocked down on the second minute.

A goal at that stage would really have rocked Clarinbridge back on their heels, but as it was Gort stuck to the

game-plan and by the 12th minute had raced into a 0-6 to 0-1 lead. Mark Kerins cancelled out the Forde effort with a free on four minutes, but then Harte – who hit two gems from play after dropping deep for possession – and placed ball specialist Quinn (three frees) tallied five unanswered efforts for the victors.

Clarinbridge wing-forward Shane Burke did cut the deficit, following a neat pass from Kerins, at the close of the opening quarter, however, within minutes, Gort had further extended their advantage after scores from Quinn (free) and Fahy, the latter following great work in defence by McMahon. They now led 0-8 to 0-2.

The champions were in real trouble now and they sensed it. However, true to their spirit and commitment, they mounted a late surge in the closing minutes of the first half to outscore the challengers four points to one. All four of those efforts came from the unerring dead ball accuracy of Mark Kerins, while Harte tallied Gort's effort following good work from Killilea.

While the 'Bridge had cut the deficit to three, 0-9 to 0-6, at the half-time break, Clarinbridge had to start winning more of the individual battles around the park in the second period if they were to retain the Tom Callanan Cup.

Initially, they were unable to
do that as Quinn tallied two

more frees and O'Donoghue sent over an opportunistic effort from play in the opening five minutes of the half. For their part, Clarinbridge were still relying on Kerins, who converted a 33rd minute free, to keep them in touch and it was notable that the champions, by this time, had only posted one point from play through Burke.

What the future holds after that, who knows? This could possibly spell the end for some of their older players, but at least the conveyor belt of talent has begun to churn out potential replacements in the likes of Billy Lane, Barry Keane, Shane Mannion and Ciaran Morrissey, to mention

but a few. It may just take time. As with all finals, though, it will be the heroes from the winning side who will be remembered. Indeed, when the dust settles on this one – probably around Christmas – the day of November 6, 2011 should make for some interesting debates in the various households around Gort.

You can just imagine the great Gael that is Josie Harte – the teak-tough corner back who captained the previous Gort team to victory in '83 – kidding his son and man of the match Aidan that he would never have shot those four points from play in his day . . . and to come back to him when he has that second county medal in his back pocket! There was no prouder man – or father – than Josie on Sun-

or father – than Josie on Sunday.
